# Tuskegee Airman honored

On Monday, Aug. 27, family and friends gathered at the Southern Maine Veterans Cemetery in Springvale to say farewell to one of the last remaining Tuskegee Airman, MSgt. James Sheppard, Jr. The Tuskegee Airmen were the first black military pilots in the US Army Air Corp, a precursor of the US Air Force. They were trained at the Tuskegee Army Air Field in Alabama and they flew more than 15,000 individual attacks in Europe and North Africa during WWII. History. com states, "Their impressive performance earned them more than 150 Distinguished Flying Crosses and helped encourage the eventual integration of the U.S. Armed Forces." Sheppard was one of 300 airmen to be awarded the Congressional Gold Medal by George W. Bush in 2007.

MSgt. Sheppard was born on Sept. 20, 1924 and died on Aug. 19, 2018 at the Maine Veterans Home in Scarborough. He had four children; Arthur of New York, Robert of Kittery, Eric of Virginia and Cathy Madison of Washington, D.C.

According to the Maine Bureau of Veteran Affairs, MSgt. Sheppard was trained as an Aviation Maintenance Technician and acted as Crew Chief. He was deployed with the Red Tail Squadron to Italy where his skill and leadership played a key role in the success of the group's aerial combat missions.

Eric Sheppard, son of the late MSgt. Sheppard proudly spoke of his father, "He was born in Harlem, New York and enlisted in the Army Air Corp in 1942 at the age of 18." He was already a certified aviation mechanic having trained at the Haaren Aviation Technical School in New York City.

of Eliot received the news in July that they had been selected for homeownership with Habitat for Humanity.

While some of his classmates were hired directly from school, opportunities for an African-American were limited so he chose to enlist in the military. Sheppard was assigned to the 301st Fighter Squadron and shipped overseas. At the time of his enlistment, Sheppard had wanted to be a pilot but because of his training as an aviation mechanic he was assigned to that position at the Tuskegee Army Air Field. After the war in 1945 he worked for various airlines as an aircraft mechanic and served as a reservist for ten years where he earned the rank of Master-Sargent. He spent the rest of his career (Continued on page 4)

Tamay Alpander is President of this non-profit organization that provides a safe place for horses to go when their racing days are over. It is a costly endeavor to supply food, veterinary assistance and care to these once great race horses. At the Sancturary the horses are met with love and attention and rehabilitation. Here they are provided care for injuries, training in skills that may lead to new careers and finding new homes. If horses are not adoptable they will find a forever home with Alpander. They offer horse sponsorship programs that will give the donor the opportunity to help their racehorse with a monthly donations. You can also help by donating feed, grooming tools and supplies. A sponsor can give their time to brush, walk and graze their sponsored horse.

At the fundraiser we met a horse named Shapleigh Benz. Ben, as he is called is a retired Maine bred racehorse who road at Suffolk Downs in Boston. with the Federal Aviation Administration and was the Supervisory Aviation Safety Inspector in the Flight Standards Department.

Sheppard moved to South Portland in 1972 and retired as a Safety Inspector in 1987. By that time, he held three FAA Airmen Certificates in Private Pilot, Aviation Mechanic and Senior Parachute Rigger.

The interment ceremony began with a prayer by Rev. Christine Stanley. In her eulogy, she recalled MSgt. Sheppard as a great storyteller and loved to work on airplane mechanics in High School. In his later years he became a great motivational speaker. She ended by saying MSgt. Sheppard was "a wonderful man and also a wonder-filled man." He was not afraid to ask questions. The Air Force Honor Guard proceeded to ceremoniously fold the flag and Col. John Thomas, USAF, Ret., presented the flag to Sheppard's oldest son, Arthur. Col. Thomas told the family Sheppard "honorably served the nation." Concluding the ceremony, Amaging Grace was hauntingly played on the Bagpipes by Al Halliday. The deceased ashes were placed for interment beside his wife, Lucille, who died in 2006.

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

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ing is available and can be reliable for environmental allergies, unlike for food allergies. Allergies in pets can cause skin infections, extreme itching, recurrent ear infections, and chronic anal gland issues.

Treatment for environmental

Some treatments can have adverse side effects and immunotherapy can take an extended period of time to begin working. If allergies are severe enough it is important to resolve any secondary infections with antibiotics.

Applicants for the home underwent a rigorous review process by Habitat's Family Services Committee. Applicants must demonstrate a need for better housing and be able to meet income/payment requirements on the new home. The selected family must also put in 400 hours of sweat equity hours by working on the construction of their own home, attending financial management classes, and volunteering with Habitat for Humanity. When the home is completed, families purchase homes through an affordable mortgage that is recycled to support the construction of more Habitat for Humanity homes.

Amy Nucci, Executive Director, said, "Rich and Missy are genuinely excited for this opportunity and what it means for their family. We are thankful for all the donors and sponsors whose generosity has and will help make safe, stable and affordable housing a reality for the Lathrop family.'

A three-bedroom home will be built on Kirk Street in Springvale. In early 2018, Habitat for Humanity York County purchased the vacant property by working with Sanford's Land Bank Authority and the property owner. 

Maine Senior FarmShare has 1,000 openings

Seniors can get \$50 worth of fresh fruits and vegetables from local farmers

The Maine Department of Agriculture. Conservation and Forestry (DACF) announced that it has received additional funding from USDA's Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program to support its Maine Senior FarmShare Program. These funds will provide \$50 worth of fresh fruits and vegetables to an additional 1,000 Maine seniors for the duration of this growing season. The program is for Maine seniors who are 60 and older and meet income eligibility guidelines. Seniors must sign up with a farm by Sept. 21.

Maine's Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program, Maine Senior FarmShare, is managed by the Maine Department of Agriculture and supported by partner agencies throughout Maine. It utilizes a community-supported agriculture model to maximize benefits to local produce farmers and low-income seniors. During the 2017 season, participating farmers provided fresh fruits, vegetables, and herbs directly to approximately 17,000 low-income seniors throughout Maine.

Maine's program provides individual Maine seniors with \$50 worth of fresh fruits and vegetables during the growing season.

A "share" is \$50 worth of fruits and vegetables delivered directly to seniors. Farmers may also have seniors come to their farm, a farmers' market or other distribution sites where seniors can select what they want and "draw down" on their credit balance. Available fruits and vegetables vary from farm to farm, for September through November they may include: squash, corn, apples, beets, broccoli, eggplant, radishes, pumpkins and potatoes.
